

Arago, Fresnel and the “Geometric Phase”

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A recent article [1] discussed work of Arago around 1811 concerning the optics of a stack of polarizers. Readers may be interested that a continuation of this work by Arago and Fresnel made the first identification of what is now called the “geometric phase”, as discussed in Ref. [2]. A short review of the concept of the “geometric phase” is given in Ref. [3].
